NTCI 100th Anniversary Limited Edition Book

Hail North Toronto: Celebrating a Century is a limited edition book being produced in celebration of our school's 100th anniversary. It will capture memories of our years at NT with a combination of photos and personal anecdotes.

Teams of alumni volunteers have sourced the school Archives and reached out to the North Toronto community in order to compile a history of our collective legacy and personal experiences.

NT evolved from serving a rural town, to become a citywide school earning its reputation for superior academics, athletics, spirit and music. The physical facilities were upgraded many times, most recently with a brand-new building in 2010, but the people and programs have always been at the centre of its story.

Curriculum innovation and superb teaching were and still are legendary. Sports dominated, music inspired and clubs engaged. These personal stories are at the heart of this tale.

"Wind students were required to play in the Marching Band. That was fine by me. The Band was fun, and we had a great time marching in the Santa Claus Parade. The problem came when the band played at half time of our football games. Since I played on the football team, I figured there would be an exception for me. Not so. Rules were rules. Much to my consternation and everyone's amusement, after the second quarter I had to quickly rip off my football jersey, don my band jacket, and play the trombone at my own half time performance! Thankfully this requirement was later relaxed."

Red & Grey Spirit Campaign is Over the Top

The Red & Grey Spirit Campaign — conducted since 2008 by the Foundation and concluded December 31, 2010 — exceeded its \$300,000 target and is helping to fund the multi-faceted Heritage Program.

Thanks to the generosity of its 8000 alumni, staff and friends, the school's distinguished 100-year history is being celebrated and incorporated into the new building in a manner that wouldn't have been possible without this support.

It's a Work-in-Progress

Work continues: to populate the display cabinets with reminders of our history, finish the wall display panels, install the school's name on the north wall, complete the computer-display systems, and install the Wall of Spirit.

And, of course, work will commence on the new playing field when demolition of the old building is complete. Plan to come back for the 100th Reunion in May 2012 (see article on page 2) to see all this in place.

Heritage Program is Largely in Place, But Still Ongoing

Key features of the Program include:

The Heritage Court: interior courtyard which includes architectural features reclaimed from the original 98-year old building; inscribed paving stones honouring former teachers, students, teams and activities; a historic plaque describing these features of the Court and listing the school's nine Principals since 1912; a honey locust tree; and sitting areas — a favourite student retreat.

The Heritage Room: meeting room for the Foundation's Advisory Board and other purposes which contains heritage displays and the school portrait of the building circa 1955, commissioned by the Foundation and painted by artist Barry Bowerman (NT'67).

The Archive Room: stores and preserves NTCI's history in the form of key documents, photos and digital records.

Wall Panels: student honour boards, war memorial plaques and framed photos commemorating generations of NT grads; scholars, athletes, musicians and those who, as soldiers, gave their lives for Canada.

School Banner: permanent bracket on the north wall for a display banner that can be seen by passers-by on Broadway Avenue, currently featuring NTCl's 100th Anniversary Reunion, May 10-13, 2012.

A Time Capsule: placed behind the cornerstone by the front entrance; contains, (among other things) a letter from today's NT alumni and Principal to the school's students 100 years from now, when this building may be replaced and the capsule opened.

School Name: permanent lettering on the north wall, more visible from Broadway than the existing lettering on the west wall overlooking the playing field.

Display Cabinets: distributed in the halls; displaying trophies, photos and other memorabilia.

Display Screens: computer-driven display screens that will be installed in the main lobby and in the Heritage Room.

Wall of Spirit: plaques permanently recognizing the more than 500 donors who gave \$310,135 to help make this happen and naming teachers and others honoured by many of the donations.

New School Facts

The 85 staff and 1180 students now occupy a 156,000 square foot LEED building with 46 classrooms, 9 with state of the art science equipment.

In addition, on the first floor there are three music classrooms with five music practice rooms, a fully equipped drama studio with curtains and mirror wall and a fully equipped digital/keyboard music lab and the *pièce de resistance*; a spectacular new theatre.

On the second floor there are three art rooms, a kiln equipped pottery room, a darkroom, a digital media computer lab, the staff lounge and a large, bright new library with numerous study carrels and computer stations, and the NTCI Alumni Association Heritage Room.

The majority of the classrooms are on the third floor along with a dedicated yearbook room, and a room for the student council and school newspaper.

The top floor is home to more classrooms, the science rooms, a greenhouse and access to the green roof.

James "Jim" Jones

Jim taught biology at NT from 1990 to 1996. A popular and fair-minded teacher, he had a PhD in zoology (UofT, 1977) and experience studying wildlife. He worked for the Ministry of Natural Resources before the teaching bug got him and earned his BE in 1989, starting at NT the next year. He then moved to Riverdale where he taught and served as Department Head for Biology. Promoted to Curriculum Leader for science at Jarvis in 2003, he was still there in 2009 when he fell ill. He passed away on February 9 of this year.

The Hon. Keith Davey

Born in Toronto in 1926. Keith graduated from North Toronto and soon became sales manager for radio station CKFH, leaving in 1960 to become a campaign manager for the federal Liberal party in Eglinton riding. The following year he was appointed National Campaign Director, presiding over the party's efforts in the next four federal elections. During this time he earned the nickname "The Rainmaker" for his ability to bring success from the most hopeless situations and is widely credited with helping lay the foundation for Liberal political success over the following decades. He became a senator in 1966, serving for just over 30 years. He passed away on March 17.
