Tools of the Trade

Access to the internet. Not just at home but at many other places. Wireless connections have increased the risk.

Search Engine Translation Feature: If you find, a different language on your home computer, that no one in your family speaks, your child may be translating their message into a different language before sending it. It is easy for the sender and receiver to use a program to translate.

Security: There are many ways to find out who you are via “reverse telephone phone directories” on the net. It can happen via other ways as well. One of the largest directories that is bought and sold is Pizza Pizza.

Wireless: Make sure you install properly and know the security features in the router. You should password protect your wireless. In one case, a student was inadvertently picking up the entire hard drive of their next door neighbour!

Free Email: Yahoo, Hotmail, gmail (Google’s email). Be aware. With gmail, you can store information off-site.

School Sucks.com: A site where you can download a term paper for almost anything.

Freevote.com: Polling booths. You can put up whatever type of polling booth you want. There are many polls for high schools in Toronto with questionable polls. For example,

“which girl is the hottest at X high school?” If your child is the subject of an offensive poll, send an email to the host site, and ask them to remove it.

MSN. The pop-up box that says ‘so and so has just signed on’ is just a screen name. Tell your kids to turn on logging as this feature will capture the entire conversation (just a box you check). The help feature in MSN is very good. Sometimes in some chat systems, it may be called ‘message history’.

Passwords: Do not let your children use passwords. Who is paying for the computer, who is paying for the internet – the parent!

Thought: If you don’t want the Whole Wide World to know, don’t put it on the internet!

Dark Side of the Internet: Examples are: 1) ‘Overthrow.co’ which includes terrorist information, 2)The School Stopper’s Textbook (a guide to disruptive tactics for high-schoolers) and 3)The Anarchist Cookbook showing how to make bombs and a chapter on terrorizing teachers. Also phrack.org where all the bad guys go to brag on topics like how to make TNT. Other examples are The Torture Network which shows a taste of real life stomach churning violence and graphic carnage and ogrish.com showing very graphic accidents.

Case Study

Robert J, 14 year old male, lives at home, student living in North York. Found teacher’s sales receipt in bag that the teacher brought in for a school project. The receipt had the teacher’s credit card number. The student obtained the teacher’s license plate registration from the car in the school parking lot. He then went to a Ministry of Transportation kiosk and using the credit card number, found out address, birth date. He began to order items on the internet and tracked delivery on internet. Arranged for the packages to be dropped at the school, while he was working in the office. The student was arrested – by this time he had racked up \$16,870!!!

Stephen R. Grade 11 student, a bit of a loner. Lived on the dark side, fascinated by anarchy, dressed in black, member society Goth, spent hours on chat lines. Got a job in the library, was a trusted employee, obtained a supervisor’s password, began to steal money and property on line. He would go home, sign on, and remove any trace of the product ever existing at the library. He collected material, gave it to friends and the school. He became very popular with friends which further encouraged him. He was discovered and arrested.

How do they hide it? There are numerous ways including small USB ports worn on a necklace around the neck, cell phones, personal digital devices etc.

Personal Security

Password Protection and Security: don't leave your password out near your computer or use the same one again.

Personal Security: don't give out personal information.

E-mail addresses on business cards: don't use your personal email address or perhaps use a nickname versus your full name.

Code names non de plume: Have your kids use different names versus their full one.

Credit Cards Secure Sites: Make sure there is a little padlock at the bottom of the site. It should read https (http is not secure).

Music Performance on Thursday, November 24th: Several performances took place. A neat experience was seeing 101 students perform together as a massed band.

North Toronto Bands performed at Vaughn Mills, Woodbine Centre and the Santa Claus Parade on the week-end of November 19th/20th. The Marching Band will be performing at the Markham Santa Claus Parade this Saturday, November 26th. Members of the Toronto Symphony came in and did sessions with The Symphony Orchestra.
