1. Welcome - Parent Council co-Chair Jane Lewis

2. What is Happening at NT - Student Council Report (Nina and Yasmin) and teacher Helen Elliott

- Charity week Jan. 18 22 raising money for a charity chosen each year by students. This year the chosen charity is "Not for Sale" aimed at abolishing child slavery. Charity week will include home form events in each classroom and other special events throughout the school, trying to raise over \$40,000.

- Eco program certification continuing; waste audit was done by first collecting 35 kg of school garbage. After sorting out the food waste, reusable things, recyclable items, batteries, paper waste, soiled paper, the "pure" garbage was only 7.5 kg (17.5 kg was food and soiled paper and the rest recyclables). This audit was repeated in a smaller scale later with same results. The school Eco Club is working on the plans for new school (deciding on types of recyclable bins, installing hand dryers in bathrooms, etc.) and running class competitions in good environmental practices now to get the NT students used to it for the new school. The Eco Club will come to the next School Council meeting in January.

- NTCI statistic 90% of students go to university, 5% to college, 5% other (workplace, etc.)
- Top 10 general tips for all grades
 - o Build routines, they become habits early
 - o Encourage the success of the routine
 - o Don't try to break bad habits, replace them with good ones
 - o Be interested, look interested, act interested
 - o Talk about your child classes, their day
 - o set clear specific attainable goals, fulfilling goals gives power
 - o offer to help with homework, be supportive, but not overbearing, encourage peer tutoring
 - o become a good listener, listen to what teens are saying
 - o encourage involvement in extracurricular activities (important for university applications), daily exercise
 - monitor jobs and encourage volunteer involvement early in high school (important for university applications Personal Statement of Experience); ensure volunteering hours are logged and signed off in the Volunteering Passport (min 40h); for opportunities sign up for the NTCI Student mailing list from guidance department, check Guidance board and binder, check Sola Caritas site
- DON'T
 - o Nag about marks
 - o Criticize teachers
 - o Make your child's failure/success your own
 - o Miss school unnecessarily
- DO
- o Work positively with school (teachers, admin staff)
- o Get involved, attend parent nights, school functions, volunteer
- WHAT IF things are not going well look for:
 - o poor attendance and truancy, they are related to school drop out, set up action plan
 - o course appropriateness
 - o accountability (rules that are worth having are worth enforcing)
 - o alcohol/drug use
 - personal and family issues, especially signs of depression US statistics for Grade 8-10 students – 61% expressed sadness, 36% have nothing to look forward to, 34% contemplated suicide
 - o unhappiness at school
- Tips for Grade 9
 - o NT draws from 54 different feeder schools
 - o Some students adjust better than others
 - o Encourage self advocacy with teachers
 - o Start volunteering

- Consider international languages (Spanish, German, Latin) 3 years provides university credit
- o US and international schools look at Grade 9 marks
- o Sign up for NT parent and student e-mails
- Check Shad Valley summer program (grades 9, 10, 12), compared to Harward program
- Tips for Grade 10
 - o Take Careers course seriously
 - o Is 5th year a possibility? Plan appropriately, i.e if planning Engineering, take the Physics and Calculus in year 5
 - o Be open to more than one post-secondary destination
 - o Ramp up the volunteering work
 - o Not late to consider international language
 - US and international schools look at Grade 10 marks
- Tips for Grade 11
 - o Crucial year for planning, hugely important
 - o Consider co-op for a group 3 credit (Grade 11 Science)
 - o If doing a 5th year, set up courses appropriately
 - o Canadian universities look at Grade 11 marks for early admission, project the Grade 12 marks
 - o Consider JVIS (vocational survey) for career/study direction
 - o If considering US schools, SAT process needs to start
 - Volunteering work should be completed
 - o US and international schools look at Grade 11 marks
- Tips for Grade 12
 - o Sign up for NT Grad e-mail list, find out about university visits at NT, etc.
 - o Work hard from day 1, no room to coast
 - o Each student should have a post secondary file
 - o Attend all Grad workshops (scholarships, PIN workshop, etc.)
 - o Do research, visit campuses, use e-info web site
 - o Encourage responsibility in school and post-secondary choices, be aware of timelines and deadlines
 - o Submit volunteering hours
